Teacher Professional Learning

During Term 3 CASE Development Officers delivered a series of TPL sessions to principals and teachers from Pilot and Cohort 1 partnerships. These opportunities were offered in line with the project's objectives of supporting high quality learning and teaching and effective leadership. The courses available to staff to date have included: 'Developing a Shared Vision', 'The Role of the Link Teacher', and 'Evaluation and Action Planning for Shared Education'. A total of 14 sessions took place in venues across the Northern Ireland and the Border Counties.

The importance of strategic leadership in creating a successful shared education partnership was highlighted in the principal's session focussing on partnership vision. Here, space was provided for school leaders to revisit and refresh the shared

vision for their partnership. The course's objectives included support for the development of practices and processes to enthuse and inspire school com-

munities, thereby creating vibrant, self-motivated, shared education partnerships.
The role of those teachers charged with managing CASE shared education programmes was explored through Link Teacher training days. Teachers were able to share proposed and ongoing activity within partnerships, examine the re-

sponsibilities associated with Link Teacher activities and develop networking opportunities. This training was further enhanced by the presence of experienced shared education teacher practitioners who were able to share their expertise and knowledge. In addition to the above courses, officers within each locality also hosted Evaluation and Action Planning days for Pilot and Cohort 1 partnerships . These sessions allowed partnerships to reflect on progress to date and draw up more targeted action plans for next 2018/19.

All schools were invited to participate in a simple survey regarding further TPL to support the delivery of high quality educational and reconciliation outcomes. The courses currently available will be expanded in the next academic year and we thank this year's participants for their time and commitment to developing good shared practice.

ning process, shared lessons and resources were developed to ensure that the expertise of teachers was utilised and that pupil learning was maximised. From digging holes to making caves, creating slime creatures and writing group poetry the children became more

familiar with each other every week, working together and learning together. Immersion in the Shared Education programme has given teaching staff confidence in areas of drama and creative writing. Both schools look forward to this project expanding and continuing next year.
