

The song "The Times They Are a-Changin'" was written by Bob Dylan in 1964. I can only imagine the thought process of people in 1964 as they moved to a new world where automation of process was changing their lives. 

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


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Conference Speakers



William Beausang

William Beausang is an Assistant Secretary in the Department of Further and Higher Education, Research, Innovation and Science with responsibility for Further Education and Training, Apprenticeship and Skills Policy as well as the development of a more unified Tertiary Education System. He holds a Bachelor's in Public Administration and Masters in Economic Science, both from University College Dublin and completed the Graduate Programme in Economics at the University of Tilburg. He has previously working in the Department of Education, the Department of Public Expenditure and Reform and the Department of Finance.



Nessa White

Nessa White is Executive Director for Transformation in SOLAS, the Further Education and Training (FET) Authority. Since taking up the role in 2020 she has led out on a range of FET sector funding and capital projects, such as the FET College of the Future. Nessa works closely with a range of key partners and stakeholders ensuring effective implementation of the current FET Strategy, *Transforming Learning*. Nessa previously worked in the Department of Education as a Project Manager for the Education and Training Board (ETB) -SOLAS Project Management Office leading out on initiatives focused on reform in areas of communications, legal services and governance. In her previous roles in Education and Training Boards Ireland (ETBI) she played a key part in driving ongoing change and shared vision and was appointed to the role of General Secretary of ETBI in May 2018. Nessa has 20 years' experience across Senior Management roles in the Education and Health sector. She has a wealth of experience and expertise in the areas of change management, strategic thinking, leading people, collaborating and communicating with conviction, high performance and delivery of results, drive and resilience, expertise, self-development and self-awareness.



David Forde

David Forde was appointed Principal at Carlow Institute in July 2023, having previously been Deputy Principal, and is a member of the NAPD FETCI committee. At Carlow, David has been instrumental in the diversification of the college offering, both in occupational range and delivery type. Prior to his appointment in Carlow, David worked in the UK, latterly as a Department Head at Bridgwater College in Somerset, one of England's top-performing Further Education colleges. David is a keen promoter of developing FET colleges with a comprehensive offer for students, and is diversifying the curriculum reach at Carlow, including the introduction of new work-based learning approaches to support better engagement with industry for fulltime provision at Carlow. Whilst in the UK he piloted the first 'new apprenticeship' for Creative Industries in the South-West, and was a writer-reviewer of the National Occupational Standards for Creative and Cultural Skills in the UK. Outside of his work in education, David continues his involvement in music as a choral conductor, is Organist and Director of Music at Waterford Cathedral, and is pursuing a PhD in Music with MTU Cork School of Music.

Martin O'Brien

Martin O'Brien has an established track record in Further Education having taught at O' Fiaich College Dundalk where he established a very successful PLC Engineering course. He has extensive experience in educational leadership having served as Principal of Bush Post Primary School, Dundalk prior to accepting the role as Chief Executive Officer of Co Sligo Vocational Education Committee in 2005. His industry experience in Gypsum Industries PLC and later at Wellman International has influenced his leadership and management style throughout his career. Martin has extensive experience of leading major projects and initiatives nationally in training and skills development. He is a former member of the Apprenticeship Council and developed the OEM Traineeship in consultation with Combilift, where he later supported the development of the OEM Apprenticeship. He is presently developing Ireland's first all Island apprenticeship in Robotics and Automation. He has 19 years' experience as Chief Executive having served as Chief Executive of Sligo VEC, Monaghan VEC, Cavan and Monaghan Education and Training Board and since 2016 in Louth and Meath Education and Training Board. Martin headed up several very significant projects during his tenure including the Monaghan Education Campus €40m. He currently oversees a staff of approx. 3,000 and a budget of €238 million annually. His work designing and overseeing the construction of Ireland's first purpose built Further Education and Training College – Monaghan Institute is a flagship project for the FET sector in Ireland.

He has led the establishment of the Island of Ireland Advanced Manufacturing Training Centre of Excellence (AMTCE) in Dundalk, which is one of the global leaders in advanced manufacturing skill training for current and future manufacturing workforce and is the largest of its type in the EU. He has spent several years working on various peace projects and has recently signed several very significant MoU's with various partner organisations including Catalyst Connection in Pittsburgh, Institute of Manufacturing Research, **the AM Group** (a partnership between 3DGBIRE, Create Education, Inspire 3D) and Portview Trade Centre in Belfast.

He is currently leading the development of a number of key initiatives including the establishment of Ireland's first 'Pathfinder' Further Education and Training College of the Future in Dunboyne and last year he opened an all-Electrical Apprenticeship Training Centre in Drogheda. Several further initiatives are currently under construction across Louth and Meath, these initiatives are reflected by an increased spend last year in the region of €50M. Martin oversees in excess of 117 building projects several of these involve non-ETB schools.



Dr. Joe Collins

Dr. Joe Collins is the Director of Further Education and Training at ETBI. The role is wide and varied but ultimately very rewarding as it facilitates the education of people and fosters a culture of lifelong learning for personal, community and professional development. He works with different statutory, voluntary, community and industry & enterprise organisations to fulfil ETBI's strategic goal of leading "the strategic growth of the sector". He is a strong advocate of education and training as a means of promoting human agency for personal and collective empowerment. He has a deep interest in policy development in education and training and lifelong learning. Involvement with different communities and widening participation to non-traditional students are two areas of his work for which he has a passionate interest. However, it is not enough merely to recruit students into education, and he considers the main purpose of education is to accommodate the student's ability to engage with their own life world and to allow the student to succeed and flourish in an array of domains.

Evian Holt

Immersive Media Production

Hi, my name is Evian Holt and I am currently a student at BIFE. I am a first year student on the Immersive Media Production degree course which is a four-year course in collaboration with BIFE, BCFE and IADT.

I went to secondary in Kilcoole for 6 years, until I finished my Leaving Cert. I knew I was passionate about Game Design. I've loved analysing video games since I was young. I had my sights set on a college course in this department as I wanted to work my way into the game development industry.

I had my CAO choices set up rather incorrectly due to a misunderstanding on my own behalf and lack of guidance. My first choice on the CAO list was the Game Design course in TU Dublin. There were only 24 places on this course, so competition for places is quite high, and I was given my second choice on the list. I had received a place in a Games Development course, but I would have to move from home over 100 kilometres to Dundalk. When I researched the costs, I realised attending this course was unfeasible. The facts were that it was too far away from where I lived.

Then one of my close friends mentioned that they were going to BIFE. I immediately got in contact with BIFE, and they accepted me onto their Games Design course. I thoroughly enjoyed and gained lots of skills and knowledge in that Game Design course. I even made my first 3D FPS game in Unity as a part of the course. It was one of my favourite learning experiences I have ever had, as it taught me a lot about my passion.



While there I heard about a new degree course being offered at BIFE with IADT called Immersive media and I decided to apply for this new course. This course is incredibly impressive, not only specialising in the same topics that the Games Development course would have covered, it opened up a whole new world of knowledge to me, looking into cameras, filming, storytelling and editing. Not only is it fun and extremely educational but it is a four-year long course that will get me a Level 8 degree .

The new degree pathway has given me a chance to study locally for this level 8 degree and I have been able to progress in a way that otherwise would not have been possible because of the difficulties that would have arisen with costs of travelling and accommodation. It's been a great development for me.

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“Erasmus+ VET Mobility as a Route to the Acquisition of Transversal Skills”

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Commissioned by Léargas (National VET Team) in 2023

Report Overview

- This report explores the increasing importance of Transversal Skills as a way of navigating our complex and rapidly changing world.
- It highlights the opportunities for Vocational Education and Training (VET) organisations to enhance Transversal Skills through participation in Erasmus+ funded mobility projects.
- It examines the value of Erasmus+ mobility opportunity as a mechanism for the acquisition of Transversal Skills for VET learners and staff.

Transversal Skills have been defined by UNESCO (2019) as: “Skills that are typically considered as not specifically related to a particular job, task, academic discipline, or area of knowledge and that can be used in a wide variety of situations and work settings; for example, organisational skills. They refer to an individual’s ability to communicate, problem-solve, build and maintain relationships and adapt in times of uncertainty”.

Rationale

There is currently a lack of research at VET level and more empirical research needs to be conducted on how transversal competences can be acquired. This report aims to investigate and explore the concept of Transversal Skills, establish any consensus in terms of definition and identify priority Transversal Skills needed to succeed in the new world of work. It also seeks to start the conversation on Transversal Skills within VET, establish what they are understood to be and their level of importance at this juncture.

Audience

This report is intended for Irish VET organisations interested in exploring the area of Transversal Skills and identifying priority Transversal Skills to support VET learners and staff to navigate an increasingly complex world. It is also aimed at new entrants to Erasmus+ programme, undertaking mobility opportunities under Key Action 1, to demonstrate and showcase the transformative benefit of engaging in Erasmus+ mobility for the acquisition of Transversal Skills.


Findings

It has been continuously reported by past participants of Erasmus+ mobility projects that Transversal Skills are those most valued deriving from the VET placement experience, and that the transformative benefit of these skills impacts the individual in their life and work. Confidence, self-awareness and independent functioning were those skills most reported as valuable from participation in Erasmus+. Post the disruption caused by COVID, the identification of priority Transversal Skills has shifted from inter-personal (between people) such as collaboration, teamwork and communication to Intra-personal (within self) and include mostly those relating to Emotional Intelligence such as, resilience, self-confidence and self-regulation.

Conclusion & Recommendations

The principal conclusion from this report is that Erasmus+ mobility is a very effective mechanism to support the rapid development and acquisition of Transversal Skills. The competency framework highlights the key Transversal Skills obtained and strengthened through the European work-based placement within VET programmes.

COMPETENCY FRAMEWORK FOR TRANSVERSAL SKILLS



The framework is divided into two key sections – Intrapersonal skills and Interpersonal skills. There are four key skills falling under intrapersonal skills: Self-awareness, Self Confidence, Adaptability and Creativity. The four key interpersonal Transversal Skills highlighted are: Communication, Collaboration, Active Citizenship and Empathy.

A key recommendation is that VET organisations make intercultural work placement and Erasmus+ mobility participation an integral part of their programmes and make it a strategic priority for their organisation.



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
